**GROSSE ISLE SCHOOL** | Grosse Isle School is in Treaty 1 Territory, the traditional territory of Anishinaabeg, Cree, Oji-Cree, Dakota, and Dene Peoples, and the homeland of the Métis Nation.

Dear Parents, Guardians, and Staff,

On September 9<sup>th</sup>, 2021 we will be welcoming our students back to Grosse Isle School for the 2021-2022 School year. Our goal, as always, is to provide a safe and welcoming school community for our students and staff. The attached plan outlines the procedures and expectations we have developed in accordance with the <u>Manitoba K-12 Restoring Safe Public Schools Guidelines</u>. While this year's restrictions are *currently* in an easement, it is our hope that if we all continue to work together we will stay healthy and in school this year. I hope that our cautious and careful planning will help all members of our school community feel safe and supported.

All members of the Grosse Isle School community are encouraged to visit the divisional website regularly at <u>www.Interlakesd.ca</u> for updates, and to view current information from the province at <u>www.gov.mb.ca/covid19</u>.

In order to keep us all safe, we would like to remind everyone about the importance of the basics:

- 1. Stay home when you are sick
  - o [COVID-19 Screening Tool] [Screening Questionnaire]
- 2. Wash or sanitize your hands
- 3. Wear a mask

Our school plan reflects a cautious and careful approach to create a safe teaching and learning environment for our staff and students. While we look forward to more opportunities for our school community this year, many things will continue to be different. Some events or programs may still not be possible based on current public health orders, and there are even a few things we learned to love last year and have kept! As a staff team, we are committed to continuing as well as, finding new and creative ways to make Grosse Isle School a safe, fun, and respectful place to learn, grow, and work together!

Our plan has been organized into three sections:

- 1. Teaching and Learning: How will in-class learning take place?
- 2. Building Operations: How will we continue cleaning and operations so we are safe at school?
- 3. Family Preparedness: What is my responsibility as a parent, guardian or caregiver?

Our collective efforts to follow the public health measures will help ensure that our students and staff have a safe and enjoyable school year. The first day of school will be September 9<sup>th</sup>. Our open house has been cancelled however we are hoping to come up with an alternative plan to welcome you into our building in safe ways in the coming months!

## Teaching and Learning 2021 – 2022 at Grosse Isle School

1. Student Learning Preparedness: How will Grosse Isle School ...

#### a. Masks

- i. Provincially, masks are required for all staff and for students in grades K-12.
- ii. Masks are required at all times while indoors (including the gym)
  - Proper mask wearing means that the reusable or disposable mask covers the nose, mouth, and chin and is sealed as best as possible on each of the sides.
- iii. Students may remove their masks:
  - To eat and drink when SEATED at their assigned spot during scheduled nutrition breaks
  - or when outdoors for classes or recess.
- iv. Masks must also be worn on school busses to and from school each day.
- v. Parents are asked to supply masks, however there are masks available at school if needed.

#### b. Cohort students

- i. Due to the population of Grosse Isle School [46 students; 10 staff], we will be operating as **one** cohort
- What is a cohort: <u>Cohorts</u> involve keeping groups of students (groups less than +/-75 students) together and avoiding interactions with other groups. (Manitoba's Restoring Safe Schools, 2021)
- c. Learning materials and manipulatives
  - i. Students can now share toys, equipment, tools, supplies, and manipulatives in classrooms if proper hand hygiene is used before and after use, and for items that can be sanitized.
  - ii. Our library is open for use again.

#### d. Classes, Classrooms, Homerooms, Seating plans?

- i. To minimize risk, teachers, students and classes will be asked to limit their travel to their scheduled classroom and to have learning experiences outdoors as much as possible.
- ii. The 5/6's (22 students) Homeroom teacher: Ms. Chelsea Dutkiewich; Room: 112
  - The 5/6's will spend the day together for all classes except **3/6** of their math classes, during which they will be separated by grade level

f. Recovery Learning and Transition planning	
i. Our first priority in our return to school is always to focus on classroom culture and routines, the rebuilding of community, and strengthening relationships. That remains our priority this back-to-school season!	
ii. Transition planning took place for our students, May/June 2021.	
iii. Teaching and learning needs that are identified as we progress through the year will be addressed with communication and collaboration between: last year's teacher (if needed), the current teacher, learning support team, and in collaboration with students and their families.

Our teachers will use their existing initial assessment processes along with the information from our transition meetings in May/June 2021, as well as the June 2021 report card.</li> <li>Additionally, each home room class has been scheduled one period each cycle in which students can seek support or additional time for ongoing or outstanding assignments, organizational and prioritization support, or if</li> </ul>	
students have had areas of need identified where they may have the	

	opportunity to have some 1:1 support.
v.	Parents and guardians are also welcome to contact teachers with additional information and questions about programming.
g. Outd	oor Learning, Physical Education, and Activity Breaks
i.	<u>CURRENTLY masks will not be required outdoors</u> . They will be required AT the entrances, so that students and staff are able to meet the public health order of masks ON in all public indoor spaces.
ii.	Use of our playground, yard, and community spaces for physical education and outdoor learning is strongly encouraged at Grosse Isle School.
iii.	<ul> <li>When students arrive at school each morning, they will play outdoors until we begin a staggered entrance at 8:45am at their designated entrance.</li> <li>5's → Front Door → Ms. Dutkiewich will call them second with the 7's</li> <li>6's → Front Door → Ms. Dutkiewich will call them first with the 8's</li> <li>7's → Yard Door → Mrs. Baldwin will call them second, with the 5's</li> <li>8's → Yard Door → Mrs. Baldwin will call them in first with the 6's</li> </ul>
iv.	<ul> <li>All students will be required to go outside during activity breaks.</li> <li>Indoor activity breaks occur with inclement weather (pouring rain, extreme winds) or -27C and colder, otherwise we ask that students are dressed (or have clothing with them) to be safely outside AT LEAST 2-3 times daily.</li> </ul>
v.	If your child has been screened at home as healthy to attend school, the expectation is that they will participate in the outdoor portions of the school day.
vi.	To further separate students, entry will be staggered to increase physical distancing and students will be required to wash their hands (or sanitize) upon entry into the building or when moving learning spaces, as well as various other times during the day.

i.	Extra Curricular activities
	i. Extra-curricular programs and activities including sports and field trips are currently permitted.
	ii. They must follow public health orders, and the MHSAA return-to-play guidelines for each sport.
	iii. In the fall, we traditionally have Cross-Country and Volleyball. Please know that we will likely take at least the first half of September to work our way through back-to-school procedures and protocols, before extra-curricular activities commence.
j.	MS Teams and Office 365
	i. Learning may continue to look a little different and will continue to include technology.
	ii. This will ensure that our students are as prepared as we are able in the event of either a hybrid (remote and in-school) or a fully remote instructional structure that MAY occur during this school year, dependant on the recommendations of public health.
	iii. This way students and staff are better prepared and practiced with the technology.
	iv. The same four core courses (Math, ELA, Science and Social Studies) will be set-up on Teams by the end of September, if not sooner. And remaining classes may have a presence on Teams if reasonable for the teacher.
	v. This will allow teachers and students to learn the platform alongside curricular outcomes.
k.	Remote Learning:
	<ul> <li>i. Occasional, or Sporadic Remote Learning will be available in some capacity for our students who are home because of a <b>short term</b> public health requirement (isolation/quarantine) or are <u>symptomatic</u>. Similar to last year, students would reach out to teachers via teams for work or class instruction access IF they are able.</li> <li>This would be organized <b>per student, and per incidence</b>, as this process (like last year) evolved as the year progressed.</li> </ul>
	ii. <u>Full-time, on-going Remote Learning</u> will be available for students who are medically advised not to return to in-class learning due to COVID-19 related factors either for themselves or someone they live with. The Manitoba Remote Learning Support Centre will provide remote learning for students in Kindergarten to Grade 8. 	iii. <u>Full-time, on-going Learning from Home</u> for families who may not meet the medical requirements but whose personal beliefs or comfort levels would be best met through home-based learning are required to register through the <u>Home School</u> <u>Office of Manitoba Education and Training</u>

## Building Operations 2021 – 2022 at Grosse Isle School

### 1. Building Operations Preparedness: How will Grosse Isle School... a. Plan for increased cleaning, sanitization, and hand hygiene? i. Public health has determined that COVID-19 transmission from surfaces is low, however we will continue to clean and disinfect high touch surfaces and washrooms, with an increased frequency. ii. Our school custodian, Mrs. Manchulenko, will keep her hours as before and will continue to work evenings to ensure that the building is cleaned and sanitized each evening. iii. During the day some custodial time has been shared with Mrs. Breckman. She will sanitize washrooms and high touch points in particular (ie: doorknobs, light switches, locker handles, pushbars, etc). Staff will also assist if needed. When students are moving learning spaces, staff will sanitize surfaces and students will sanitize their hands. The current timetable reduces student movement as much as possible. This is • an effort to reduce hallway movement and allows sanitizing to be focused. Students will be required to wash or sanitize their hands: iv. a. Upon each entry into the building b. when moving learning spaces c. after coughing, sneezing, or blowing nose d. after using the washroom e. before and after eating f. before and after the use of shared items/equipment g. before getting on the bus to go home h. when necessary Sanitizing pumps will be available in every space. v. We will put a limit on the number of students in the bathrooms to 3 students at a time, vi. which will mean that students have adequate space while in the bathroom and to avoid congregating. b. Physical Distancing i. There is CURRENTLY no provincial or public health requirement for physical distancing in schools, but they have provided the following: a. Provincial Recommendations for Physical Distancing in Schools: Schools should encourage physical distancing to the greatest extent possible Schools will manage the flow of people in common areas, including hallways and washrooms to minimize crowding and allow for ease of

people passing through.
